

I went on the Riding Holiday in Mongolia with challenged riders from 18th to 22nd June, which is an annual event for me since 2001. Some people might remember my poster "RDA BEYOND THE BORDER" at the 2003 FRDI congress in Budapest, which documented my first holiday in Mongolia with challenged riders.

As usual I started to prepare for the holiday in January and we were about to decide in March who would attend, when the disaster happened in the East of Japan. After that, everyday life changed and lots of activities and events were cancelled in Japan. About the end of April, the life in Tokyo was gradually back to normal, but I was still thinking if we should carry out the holiday or not after such destructive disasters. After talking with some people the decision was finally made: "We will do it!" Since there were challenged riders and their family who would benefit from this chance right now, I was quite sure that the motto "if we could, we should" was appropriate.

20 people, including 6 challenged riders with autism, brain injury, Down syndrome, developmental disorder and visual impairments as well as their family, friends, volunteers were in our group.

They were all excited and nervous on the first day at the airport, but soon it changed to excitement, fun and relaxation in Mongolia.



The aim for this second meeting was to share the knowledge and skills in psychopedagogical aspects in hippotherapy. To bring up the core elements of hippotherapy education and critical evaluation of teaching methods.

Contents of the second workshop:

Friday 15.04.2011

The official opening was made by Anna Strumińska, she welcomed participants at the Workshop 2. After that Anne Rokka Project Manager also welcomed everyone at the Workshop 2. Anne reminded that this is a continuation of what started last year (Workshop 1).

The first lecture was presented by Lynne Munro (UK) and was about different teaching styles. Lynne presented four different learning styles: activist, reflector, pragmatist, theorist. Her lecture reminded us that while teaching others we should remember about different preferences of learning styles of our students and teach them in the most effective way.



Joanna Dzwonkowska and Aleksandra Szymańska (PL) had two main goals of their workshop. First was the integration of the participants and second goal was to sensitize participants to the needs of the disabled in psychopedagogical aspects in hippotherapy. show participants some difficulties which
their patients might be facing.



Then Annette Lindroos (FIN) presented two lectures. First one was the introduction of the Finnish hippotherapy education and the psychopedagogical aspects in hippotherapy. Riding skills are not primarily taught for the client in hippotherapy. Second presentation was about the hippotherapy triangle which is bond/relation between the horse, the rider and the therapist. The processes and dynamics in the triangle are changing depending on the individual needs of the patient and the relation with the horse and the therapist.

Movement Dialogue and was presented by Liisa Hoffren (FIN). Movement dialogue has many different forms. Common and well known form is to use the movement of a horse's back but the movement dialog can also be used when not mounted. Liisa reminded us that not the same movement dialog is proper for everyone, it all depends on development of the patient and his/her environment.

The last lecture was presented by Lila Tauriainen(FIN). It was about the skills and knowledge a student must have in order to interpret the actions of a horse during a therapy session and use that information as a tool to rehabilitate a patient. Lila highlighted that it is important to know your horse and his reactions when you are using his behavior in different therapy situations. It is easier to train your horse to co-operate with you if you have a good relationship with your horse and he respects you.

Later, the core group met to plan future meetings.

Saturday 16.04.2011

The day started with the workshop of Barbara Gąsiorowska and Joanna Salbert (PL) concerning children games and their role in the child development. The

participants worked in groups and presented popular children games in the UK, Finland and Poland. The main difference was found in the role of the horse in the therapy process. The Finnish hippotherapy represents method of "work with the horse", the horse is equal with the therapist. The UK and the Polish hippotherapy represents method of "work on the horse", the main concentration is on the relation between the therapist and the patient, while using the extra motivation and stimulation coming from the company of the horse.



Afterwards there was a presentation of the children games from each country during the practical session on the horses, which was held by Natalia Smagacz (PL). One person from each country had a chance to show the rest of the participants how these games are adapted during the session with the patient. There were three horses available during this practice.

Barbara Gąsiorowska and Joanna Salbert presented other methods of working with children: "Knill" and "The Dots". One group was practicing Knill's methods on therapyballs inside and at the same time another group was practicing outside with horses the Dots with Natalia Smagacz.

All participants traveled to the campus of the Warsaw University of Life Sciences - SGGW to enjoy dinner. It was a great social occasion, also three husbands of the Finnish participants joined us during the dinner. The day was full of new experiences and we had new subjects to discuss during the meal.

Sunday 17.04.2011

Sunday began with the lecture about Alternative and Augmentative Methods of Communication presented by Joanna Dzwonkowska and Joanna Piłat (PL). The authors presented three systems of facilitated communication designed for people with hearing and speech

impairment: Pictograms, Makaton and PCS. The participants worked together on creating international Pictionary of concepts and terms related to hippotherapy.

Aleksandra Szymańska provided the summary of the Workshop 2. Aleksandra reminded us in a few words about each lecture and workshop that took place during last 3 days.

We discussed our own styles of learning and if we are using this information for our students to achieve better teaching methods. Then we talked about communication and our professional therapy methods. Further discussions about the hippotherapy triangle and the movement dialog took place.

It was agreed upon that during hippotherapy a mentally ill person is treated by professionals in the psychiatric field. In the UK the majority of hippotherapists are physiotherapists, but they are prepared for working with all kinds of patients.

Not all groups were of the same opinion about mixing other rythmical methods like Knill and hippotherapy.

The group is looking forward to the continuation of this project.
